Foreword

2021 - another year shadowed by the pandemic, but a year of hope with the rollout of vaccines and, above all, our shared commitment to pursue our mission. In this "bizarre world" that has become uncertain, we are determined to maintain our approach and decisively committed to implement our 21-25 strategy.

While postponements and cancellations threatened the success of several activities, we found new and innovative ways to pursue our work. We increased the number of online activities, multiplied the preparations for the post-Covid recovery, and developed new projects for coming years. We took advantage of the postponement of the World Water Forum in Dakar to 2022 to rethink our participation through a well-articulated and robust approach. Regarding our youth activities, we organized an online assembly of the World Youth Parliament for Water and completely rebuilt - virtually - its electoral process. Our reflection also led us to imagine new ways ofstrengthening the capacities of young people, empowering them to lead concrete actions for the sustainable present and future of our planet and societies.

Despite limited travel, we have succeeded in maintaining strong and ongoing relationships with our project partners and local stakeholders, such as in Moldova and Peru. We have even strengthened our presence in West Africa and Central Asia with the launch of new projects.

The obstacles were and remain significant everywhere: we have had to overcome the challenges imposed by the crisis to pursue our activities. That said, it was also a question of moving forward and preparing ourselves for the challenges that await us and that will result in major, sometimes radical, transformations.

We are well aware of the efforts deployed by our teams as well as the sacrifices made to face the challenges of the past year. That said, we are also proud to say that the overall review of this "bizarre year" is positive. We have capitalized on our results and capacities and are ready to face the next year with determination, commitment and courage.


Founded in 1991, the ISW-SWE is a bold, accessible and committed organization, which accelerates societal transformation and fosters cooperation.

Develop, test and validate, in countries with the most serious water problems, innovative models of water governance, often decentralized, developed with the participation of local stakeholders.




Support young actors of change, strengthen their capacity to implement innovative local projects and their commitment in decisionmaking spheres. Our goal is to be the global reference of "youth for water".



Dynamics for global transformations

The water crisis is global and interconnected with many other societal issues, such as climate change, health, peace and food security. Civil society must commit to a global awakening of States to this crisis.

In 2021, the ISW-SWE ensured that the water sector has a strong and audible voice among citizens, civil society - including youth - and decision makers.

The ISW-SWE has empowered civil society and youth to take collective positions on major so-

cietal issues, particularly in the preparatory process of the World Water Forum, which will be held in March 2022 in Dakar (Senegal). The World Water Forum, which is organized every 3 years, provides a unique platform to bring forward the priorities identified by civil society and youth.



Civil society on the move

In 2021, the ISW-SWE organized an international mobilization - through the Butterfly Effect coalition - to raise the voice of civil society organizations for water. Civil society is a force for positive and ambitious societal transformations.

This process - aiming to bring out concrete political demands - mobilized +200 civil society representatives from the water sector throughout 5 continents and led to the identification of 5 priorities.





Youth Parliaments for Water MOBILIZED

The Youth Parliaments for Water - initiated by our organization - are formed of young people and young professionals who are committed to water, to a sustainable planet and to inclusive and cohesive societies. To this day, there are more than 40 Youth Parliaments for Water in several different countries, regions, and watersheds.

In 2021, the ISW-SWE proposed an innovative virtual GLOBAL youth mobilization for water. By proposing this new formula the World Youth Parliament for Water's General Assembly, the ISW-SWE has positioned itself as a dynamic and responsive actor - as evidenced by the official recognition of the event by the World Water Forum organizers.

With 600 registered participants and over 30 partner organizations, the Online General Assembly was a major step in preparing youth engagement for the 2022 World Water Forum in Dakar (Senegal). With over 35 interactive sessions and 100 panelists, young parliamentarians were able to learn, share and be inspired by peers and professionals in the water sector: Josh Newton provided perspectives on global water governance, the Her2O organization provided key elements to develop women's leadership, the Geneva Water Hub led a discussion regarding cross-border cooperation, and the NASA demonstrated how they are contributing to sustainable water management based on satellite Earth observations.

Prior to this Virtual Assembly, we also completely rebuilt the electoral process of the World Youth Parliament for Water. Finally, and after a vibrant election campaign, the presidency, vice-presidency, and regional focal points were renewed.



Young people are able to add creative perspectives and solutions to protecting water and emphasize the urgency of this problem as we've witnessed, and experienced water-related atrocities increase in our lifetime.



In 2021, civil society representatives - including youth and young professionals from our networks - participated in various water governance platforms and mechanisms. Whether at the local, regional, or global level, we facilitated the integration of civil society representatives in decision-making spheres, reminding all of us that the discourse must be followed by action.

We actively contributed to the Glasgow COP26, the Stockholm World Water Week (virtual) and the preparatory meeting for the World Water Forum in Dakar.

Dakar, october 2021

The ISW-SWE, the Association of Young Water and Sanitation Professionals of Senegal (AJPEAS), the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) and the Executive Secretariat of the 9th World Water Forum joined forces and invited young people from all over the world to participate in the Youth Pre-Conference of the 2nd World Water Forum Stakeholders' Meeting.

The first virtual part gathered more than 80 young people, who were able to share their vision of a Youth Space at the World Water Forum 2022. This space created by and for young people, and piloted by the ISW, aims to be a place where ideas, solutions and committed people converge. During the second day in Dakar, a group of 25 young people from Senegal and abroad prepared the presence of young people at the World Water Forum.







Since my period of engagement with WYPW, I have developed remarkable skills in youth engagement, mobilization, resource development, and contribution to water policy. I have also remarkably expanded my knowledge on global water sustainability. I had the privilege of interacting with dozens of youths from different backgrounds (virtually and in person), and realized that the impact of water on youth is not regionally exclusive.

Local youth actions for global transformations

For the ISW-SWE, it is essential that young people be able to act and put their innovative ideas into practice. As such, we facilitate the implementation of field projects and position ourselves as the "guarantor" of their projects, ensuring a quality standard.

In 2021, to respond to the aspirations of young people for water, we launched a global call for solutions, through the "Youth for Water & Climate" platform; a platform supported by various partners, including the Global Water Partnership.

Finally, our jury selected 9 solutions developed by young people from 9 countries, which received a financial support of 5 000 CAD\$ in addition to technical support.

tions are implemented in Tajikistan and Uzbekistan, and we contribute to the resolution of regional issues, notably through the facilitation of a network of youth and young professionals.




Tadjikistan

The CoWaSS project - Comprehensive Water and Sanitation Project in Rural Areas of Sughd Region - implemented in partnership with Helvetas and CAICO - and financed by the Swiss cooperation - started its activities in 2021 following the preparation of the project document developed in 2020.

Despite the slowdown of activities in 2020 due to the Covid crisis, we built a real and solid partnership with the district authorities and, from there, developed partnerships with the village authorities and the population.

Much of the year was spent developing water use management plans with a focus on WASH (Water Sanitation and Hygiene). Starting with existing data on water resources in the two selected districts of Jabor Rasulov and Konibodom, Sughd province, in northern Tajikistan, two working groups composed of representatives of technical services and the population gathered all the information on the situation: access to drinking water, existing and potential water sources, status of sanitation and health practices, level of waterborne diseases, etc. After six months of intensive work, the working groups obtained a detailed picture of the situation in their district and defined an action plan.

This strategy is phased and includes the search for funding sources, based on real and accessible information. This data collection exercise and co-creation process is essential to pave the way for improving the water, sanitation and hygiene situation, which in many places is very poor. In the two districts selected as pilots, 62% of the rural population, or more than 173,000 people, do not have access to safe water. Over the next few years, the International Secretariat for Water will assist the district authorities in ensuring access to safe drinking water and sanitation for all inhabitants of these two districts.

As part of the joint activities of the project, the Regional Department of Education and the Center for Healthy Living conducted a series of activities to mark Global Handwashing Day. A total of 923 schools (more than 400,000 children) and part of the population of Sughd were educated on the importance of regular handwashing with soap as one of the simple and effective ways to prevent diseases and stay healthy.

Uzbekistan

In Uzbekistan, ISW has been an active member of a World Bank loan-funded project to help villages in the rural areas of the Ferghana Valley identify and prioritize their infrastructure needs and access loans funded by the World Bank and the Asian Infrastructure and Investment Bank.

Water plays a key role in this project as a basic necessity that is sorely lacking in these rural areas that are largely deprived of access to clean water.

The project aims to support sixty-four villages in nine different districts, including the Uzbek enclave of Sogh.

Activities began in mid-2021 and first involved training the team of 33 facilitators who began working with the villages and identifying with their people what infrastructure they would like to fund.

They developed village development plans that were consolidated at the district level to find synergies and optimize the use of available funds. Water was identified as a key priority in over 40% of the villages. The approach built by ISW in Uzbekistan and Tajikistan, based on decentralized management of drinking water and sanitation, is the model used as a reference for all villages that have chosen water and sanitation as a key priority.

In addition to this project, Taraqqiyot, the local NGO created with the initial support of ISW in Uzbekistan, overseed a project funded by the Ministry of Communal Services. The aim is to expand, under the funding of the Government of Uzbekistan, the decentralized and community-based approach piloted by ISW between 2001 and 2018, creating synergies between different funding sources by applying a unified approach with flexible modalities. This project aims to strongly contribute to solving the urgent issue of access to safe drinking water for rural populations in an area vulnerable to climate change.

ISW has implemented a long-term project for about two decades in rural areas of Uzbekistan. The biggest shift is that the government has adopted the proposed model of ISW for participatory community-managed water supply practices and now has a will to integrate it to big scale infrastructure modernization activities on the bases of the partnership of Government – Public service supplier and communities.

Youth Empowerment in Central Asia

ISW supports the development of a strong, connected, and active youth water movement in Central Asia, through the support for the Central Asia Youth 4 Water (CAY4W) network. Building the capacity of youth in the region, providing opportunities, and establishing an intergenerational dialogue to exchange knowledge and experiences are some of the areas of our work.

In 2021, we mobilized an increasing number of youths from all 5 countries in the region primarily through increased resources for virtual youth engagement, an improved social media development strategy, and an expanded scope of activities on climate change and global environmental issues.

The first transboundary dialogue for the youth in the Chu-Talas River Basin was organized by the ISW and its local partners. Built around the themes of sharing, valuing, and understanding water, this dialogue brought together more than 30 participants online. It was an opportunity to use the Blue Peace Youth Calculation inspired by the Blue Peace Index developed by the Economist Intelligence Unit to calculate the cooperation index in the Chu-Talas transboundary basin.

This project is funded by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) and is an integral part of the Central Asia Blue Peace.

The CAY4W Network in Afghanistan brought inspiration to youths through water contests, seminars, workshops, field visits, and social media programs to connect them to water areas. The network supported students' innovative ideas, youth-led research projects, and provided a space for open discussion on water topics, especially on IWRM with the ministry of water and energy, decision-makers, and other experts.

West Africa

Togo, Benin and Burkina Faso

In 2021, we were one of 15 organizations selected under the Quebec government's International Climate Cooperation Program (ICCP). This funding will allow us to implement phase 2 (2021-2023) of Your-FutureYourClimate (TFTC) - a project that will help build the capacity of local populations in Benin, Burkina Faso, and Togo to develop economic activities that are resilient to water and climate related challenges.

This second phase, launched in May 2021, involves 6 trainings; 9 awareness activities in the communities; 6 meetings with local authorities and 4 youth associations supported. This project was labeled during the 9th World Water Forum. TFTC's approach has also been used on international platforms, notably at COP 26, as part of the Climate Pavilion of the International Organization of the Francophonie.



In the past, water could no longer be found at the head of the Mekrou (commune of Kouande in Benin) once the rains were over, but today, even three months after the rains, water is present and the populations benefit from it and can carry out their socio-economic activities thanks to the TFTC project and the action of the youth.

IN TOGO

YourFutureYourClimate supports young entrepreneurs in their transition to sustainable agriculture through agroecological practices. The project also supports youth associations in the establishment of a unit of organic fertilizers and pesticides for marketing.

IN BENIN

the project contributes to improve the sustainable management of natural and water resources in the Tchoutchoubou micro-basin through the establishment of a mango orchard and the transformation of solid waste into compost for resale.

IN BURKINA FASO

the project promotes good practices in sustainable land management, climate change adaptation and biodiversity conservation to contribute to the financial empowerment of youth associations in the area.

Peru

In Peru, the ISW advocated for new water finance strategies that could accelerate the implementation of SDG 6 in the country. One ISW proposal focused on the immediate use of financial resources obtained through tariffs for ecosystem services and the transfer of unused public resources into a combined public-private fund for water and sanitation projects.

These efforts have been conducted with the National Blue Book Committee and several local public organizations and universities. Some policymakers also see the acceleration of SDG 6 as an oppor-

tunity to reduce COVID's vulnerabilities. However, the new government, which took office in July 2021, faces strong opposition, which puts the country's political stability at stake.

ISW-SWE developed its partnership with Latin Wash, and COLSAR (Latin American **Network of Community Water and Sanita**tion Organizations), Habitat for Humanity, PROCOSI, Water for People, ABIS (Bolivian Association of Sanitary Engineers), Bolivian Private University and other national partners, to carry out a Blue Book process in Bolivia.

The agreement proposed at the end of 2021 has drawn the attention of the Bolivian government, cooperation agencies present in Bolivia, and some 40 Bolivian NGOs and networks. The process continues in 2022.



A Blue Book for Bolivia will allow to consolidate the efforts of the different actors of the sector to reach directly those who have the least resources.

ISW-SWE advised the state government of Hidalgo to strengthen its work on water resilience to climate change. This collaboration attracted the interest of CAF (Latin American Development Bank), which offered the government of Hidalgo support to promote water resilience and vulnerability reduction processes.

The Mohawks of Akwesasne

Within the framework of a project financed by the Quebec government's Secrétariat à la jeunesse, 5 community projects were implemented by the Mohawk Youth (Akwesasronon) in partnership with the Mohawk Council of Akwesasne (MCA).

Moldova

We have been active in Moldova for several years with our partners (Rhine-Meuse Water Agency, Artois Picardy Water Agency, GESCOD, SDEA, etc.), and we are committed to ensure sustainable access to water and sanitation for the villages in the Nirnova basin. It is through the implementation of governance tools and the mobilization of water stakeholders at all levels that we are working towards sustainable water management on a human scale, as well as towards quality services in a more inclusive and participatory local institutional context.

The past year has confirmed our strategic position as a key actor working in favor of the implementation of intermunicipality in the country. Through the "Association of Mayors of the Nirnova Basin", we have led a global reflection on development involving all the elected representatives of the Nirnova Basin and rising to the national institutional level, and touching on concrete issues at the heart of the concerns of local actors (tariffs, choice of operator, appropriation of the master plan, etc.).

Beyond this work on governance, we have also been active in local development projects. For example, in the village of Vinatori, known for the

good quality of its groundwater, we have identified 16 water catchment points used by the population that will benefit from protection measures, thus securing the resource. The work will be completed in 2022.

2021 was also the year in which the process of developing the Nirnova River Basin Water and Sanitation Master Plan was finalized. This planning document covers 16 municipalities in the basin and provides decision-makers with a clear overview of the local water and sanitation landscape, as well as concrete proposals to address major local development issues.



European Youth Parliament for Water

For more than 20 years, the European Youth Parliament for Water (EYPW) has aimed to empower young people as actors of change in the water sector, and to strengthen their capacity to act. based on active citizenship and solidarity. This approach has allowed to reach a significant number of young people who, organized in a network, can act, and contribute to influence water-related decisions throughout Europe.

This year has been rich in events for the EYPW, which not only took advantage of the numerous opportunities offered by virtual events, but also benefited from a strong recovery of face-to-face activities. The young people have thus been able to position themselves in about thirty events, including the "Water Innovation Europe", the "Amsterdam World Water Week" and the COP 26 in Glasgow.

2021 has also allowed the EYPW to weave new partnerships, particularly in the framework of the launch of a youth work axis within the Global Alliance for Water Quality. Represented by its president, Mrs. Hasmik Barseghyan, the EYPW was strongly positioned within the COP26 in Glasgow. This COP was an opportunity for the European Youth Parliament for Water and the ISW-SWE to put forward their positions on water and climate issues and to promote their commitment through sessions, videos, presentations, and debates.

New professional development program for European youth

A new three-year European program has been launched by ISW-SWE in 2021, co-financed by the Erasmus+ program and implemented in collaboration with Cewas, the Global Water Partnership, Global Water Partnership-Hungary, Global Water Partnership-Central and Eastern Europe and Good Planet Belgium.

This program includes the establishment of an interactive community of practice, a full curriculum (4 modules and over 30 factsheets on professional and entrepreneurial development in the field of water and climate), a mentoring guide and a roadmap to enable replicability of the approach.

The first edition of this 8-month program will start in January 2022 and will bring together 20 young professionals living in Europe in 2 five-day workshops.



Financial report

IN 2021, THE COMBINED BUDGET OF THE ISW-SWE AMOUNTED TO NEARLY 1,450,869 EUROS OR 2,100,191 CANADIAN DOLLARS.

During 2021, we strengthened cooperation with our long-standing partners such as the Swiss Agency for Cooperation and Development (SDC), the French Water Agencies and the Government of Quebec, and developed new partnerships, notably with the European Union and the French Ministry of Europe and Foreign Affairs.
